



When Rabbit's friends Cat, Bear and Elephant come to help they are each scared away in turn by the mysterious voice.



The Giant Jumperee

Fun things to do!

Before reading the story, you could ask your child:

- ♦ Has anyone ever played a joke on you / have you ever played one on someone else?
- ♦ What is the most scary animal/monster you can imagine? / What is the least scary animal?
- ♦ What do you think that a rabbit would find most scary, or a cat, or a bear, or an elephant? Would these always be the same animals?

After reading the story, you could ask your child

- ♦ What did you imagine was hiding in Rabbit's burrow?
- ♦ Why do you think that all the animals were so scared when they heard the voice of the Giant Jumperee?



Make your own story props.

During the story you may like to read aloud, using your puppet cut out as part of the story. Take it in turns to be Elephant, Cat, Rabbit and Mummy Frog.



What's a Giant Jumperee? Can you draw a Giant Jumperee? Use your imagination draw your own Giant Jumperee.
